Sunday 30th June - Vintage Yacht Races - Ramsey Mooragh - 6:00pm.

We normally hold a number of different classes for each type of yacht, although we will have to see how many turn up to race. Saturday 6th & Sunday 7th July - Traditional Boat Weekend - Peel - 10:00am.

Traditional Boat Weekend actually runs for 4 days starting on Tynwald day and running through until the Sunday, the boat club being involved with a display over the weekend. The venue, which is located at the Sailors Shelter on the junction of East Quay and the Promenade in Peel, is open from 10am on Saturday for delivering models. The stand is normally manned until about 5pm on each day, so we will need a rota of volunteers to put in a few hours supervising and answering questions from members of the public. The Sailors Shelter makes an ideal venue for our static display, so please make an effort to drop your models off to put on a good show.

Scale Competition & On the Water Competition -- 5th May 2002

The weather Forecasters have done the right thing, Sunday morning started with a clear day. I am sitting in an empty car park at Silverdale waiting with some trepidation.

My fears were soon put to rest, first Bernie then Jason rolled up alongside; their cars full of boats, in Jasons case full is the right word, occupying most of the inside was his model of the Paddle Steamer Waverley.

The lake at Silverdale had over the past winter undergone a major renovation and the Forestry Division are to be congratulated on the

work carried out. It was not long before a continuous line of people were back and forth to the car park arms full of boats, transmitters and

other bits we seem to collect. The Clubs mobile harbour had been set up,

again in the words of Rod Stewart "we are sailing".

The two Judges Capt Colin Clague and Coxswain Robert Corran had arrived and were having an early viewing of the models. I am guilty in not having taken a note of the number of models, but shall we say a good cross section of vessels were on display.

Brian was first on the water with his Tug Kingsman, swiftly followed by a number of other models, no course set out this time but it did not detract from the sailing, in fact I think it actually enhanced it; normal ships don't always follow marked water, we were in international water this time.

The Judges kept moving from the static display to the vessels sailing on the lake, this will eventually decide the On The Water section of the competition. It is good that the judging can be done in such a professional

manner. Jason had two distinctly different models sailing, his U Boat performed at it's best underwater with the Waverley looking superb on the open water.

Bernie gave a display with his amphibious vehicle, unfortunately the sides of the lake were such that he could not drive the model in and out as intended, Onchan Park is ideal as it has a ramp, this model has to be seen to be believed.

Scratch built from photographs and information from various sources (no plans) a well built model.

The span of age for the models displayed ranged from Alan Goughs sailing vessel up to the modern seacat, quite a spectrum, and very impressive, the visiting public showed considerable interest, we even got a couple of new members.

I could rabbit on about the event all day, but suffice to say, it was I think a successful morning, everyone who contributed are to be congratulated, special thanks to Young Gavin Kinnin who once again come up with a new model, this time an Escort Carrier. Well done Gavin,--- I think us older hands are going to have to keep looking over our shoulders.

Models were divided into Three classes. Kit -- Semi Kit -- Scratch. They were judged on this criteria, a list of winners will be available, but all who were present were informed at the end of the event

Best overall model in the opinion of the judges was Jasons Submarine U47.

As we only had access to the lake for the morning period this seemed a good time to sample the goodies on sale in the cafeteria, it was suggested that maybe we could make better use of the lake as we could get earlier access of an evening, something we will have to look into, no pun intended.
