Regular Sunday sailing has been continuing at Silverdale, and we have succeeded in having our first two competitions albeit that the Lake is having its annual weeding problem which the lack of rainfall and water flow expatiating the problem.

But first, some Vintage sailing news from Brian King and myself.

Brian and I managed to get our report into the VMYG Newsletter relating to our last sailing on the Mooragh in September. Brian also achieved a double, in having another of his reports regarding his schooner *Fleetwing* being published, which garnered much interest and lead to him finding a lot more information regarding that large charity shop find.

The information suggested that his yacht was actually based on the schooner *Fleetwing*, and a quick Google search yielded a good photograph plus some of the original schooner's history on Wikipedia.



With the information he was able to make a new set of sails and achieve a corrected schooner rig.

Here's the comparison between what his original setup was to how it is now, rigged as a schooner.





So on March 9th Brian and I went sailing on the Mooragh in glorious weather (the start of this long spell) to sail *Fleetwing* for the first time (as a schooner) and also to try out his 48 inch Manx yacht *Redwing* for its first sailing. *Redwing* is a free sailing yacht with weighted rudder, of which she has a full set, though she also needs wind.

It was quite the afternoon just watching this pair of truly vintage yachts attempting to sail with virtually no wind around and about the Mooragh. Well done to Brian for salvaging them and re-fitting them out again. Our next Vintage Sailing day is very soon, May 25th, 2pm, Mooragh, no doubt these two magnificent yachts will be about. But it would be nice to have some wind.

Steering Competition Sunday 20 April 2025, Silverdale

Sunday was forecast to be the best weather of the Easter holiday weekend and for once the forecasters were right with ideal conditions at Silverdale lake. 10 competitors took to the water in 3 classes for the steering competition (under 1m, over 1m and the mini class). Kim Holland would have made 11 competitors, however he was unwell the previous day so didn't take part, but thank you Kim for putting the course layout and scoring sheets together.



The first class was the over 1m competition with 6 boats taking to the water. Brian Marsh was sailing his 'Sangsettia' and scored 11 points but Dave Costain had to retire his 'Happy Hunter' which he is still in the process of renovating. Scott Booth had another new model 'Pegasus' which sailed well and only lost 2 points, Brian King went one better losing only one mark with 'Victoria'. Both Jason Fleming with 'Cruiser' & Jason Quayle with 'Loyal Watcher' managed clear first rounds, so there was a run off against the clock during the second round. Both managed clear scores again but Jason Fleming lost time in the 'going astern' obstacle and had a time of 2 minutes 21 seconds compared to Jason Quayle who was slightly quicker with time of 1 minute 52 seconds.

The next class was the under 1m boats with 4 competitors. Brian King was sailing '*Titan*', Jason Quayle was sailing '*Yessir*', Brian Swinden was sailing his '*George & Mary Webb*' lifeboat and new member Paul Bromley was sailing his recently completed '*Morgawr*' tub boat. Remarkably all skippers got round losing exactly the same score – 1 mark which meant there was a 4 way run off against the clock for that class. Brian Swinden was hampered during his second run because he had lost a rudder and was only steering using the remaining rudder and by adjusting the throttle on both shafts. Times were very similar, but Brian King managed a clean second round with a time of 1 minute 24 seconds to win the under 1m class.

The final class was the mini class for boats under 600mm and attracted 5 entries. John McDermott had a round with 'Colby Girl' losing 7 marks, next Brian Swinden with 'Janeeve', Jason Fleming with 'Ramburator' and Brain King with his 'D022' fishing boat, all losing 5 marks each. The winner of the mini class was Jason Quayle sailing 'Dornoch' who managed a round losing only 1 mark.

All together a very enjoyable event and nice to see a couple of new members in attendance. Thank you to those who helped set up the course and score the rounds. Photographs of the event will be appearing on our web site in the near future and members are already looking forwards to the next event involving the buoys which is the Tug Towing on 11 May.

Tug Towing Competition Sunday 11 May 2025, Silverdale

An early start for this event as the annual weed problem needed to be overcome before any models could take to the water.

On arrival at 8:45, at the same time as Jason Quayle, we found Jason Flemming afloat in a Pedalo boat and Nigel Latham wearing chest waders already hard at work with grass rakes removing large amounts of floating weed from the area we intended to be using. JQ and myself joined in also gathering large quantities

of floating weed from the side, JQ with a garden grass rake and me with a large shopping bag gathering said weed and removing it by tipping it back down the sluice to the River below. A good 45 minutes later we had managed to clear sufficient surface water to set a course. This one I had designed to be quite simple, just seven gates to be negotiated by tug and towed casualty, neither to hit or miss any buoys.

Sign in originated with three classes, over and under one meter, and a new mini class.

There were only two over one meter tugs, *Blazer* (Jason Fleming) and *Northrock* (Scott Booth). JF went first and managed a good round with only 2 points lost. Unfortunately for Scott, his initial rudder problems on set up may have re-occurred, and after several 5's he withdrew.

The under class followed and the competition was much closer. **Yessir**, Json Quayle went first and was doing well until (word of the day) momentum of the casualty over ran an exit gate buoy thus 5 points lost. **TiTo Neri**, Nigel Latham up next and was 15 points down at run's end. **Wyreforce**, Brian Swinden headed into the lead with just 2 points lost on his run. Then me, Kim Holland with **Nudger** achieved a single lost point to creep ahead. **Independent**, John Hancox at the controls (some of the time) encountered that momentum and 9 points lost. I had another go with a newly donated boat to the Club, tug **Carlson**, and again that ever moving casualty lost 2 points. Now the master of the day arrived, **Ramburator** with Jason Fleming. He had the perfect round, CLEAR.

It all rested on Nigel Latham's shoulders with his pusher tug *Catharina 5*, sadly dropping 1 point at the first gate.

So the pusher tugs, all towing, led the field. Maybe we should try a push barge about the course one day, perhaps at Mannanan.

We attempted to get the mini tugs underway, but they were not playing the game, my first had rudder problems (now solved), my second had no rudder (my wiring) and Jason Fleming no competition.

A very pleasant morning, with several interested spectators throughout the time we were on the water. Congratulations to JF, two class wins on the day.

Also very glad to welcome along two newer members, not tugging, but having a sail anyway. A *Titanic* to watch out for 'on-the-Water', sorry no name given, and Damir Cvijetic with an upscaled 3D printed test tugboat (normally very small keyfob size). Again apologises to both, neither JQ nor myself had time to get any photos.

Thanks to everyone for their hard work, especially to NL and JF for their weed efforts, and setting out the course and not forgetting our Billy, making good use of his handy cart transporting various items to and fro the car park for all to make use of.
